ANGUS GIBSON | South Africa & UK | 2013 | 140min

The South Africa 'Up' series follows the personal journeys of a diverse group of young South Africans, born in the last years of apartheid and filmed every seven years since. First filmed aged 7 in 1992, two years before the first non-racial elections, the twists and turns of their personal lives have been charted at ages 7, 14 and 21 against the backdrop of South Africa's recent history. In the three '28Up' films, filmmaker Angus Gibson revisits them in 2013. Cutting between their younger and adult selves, a complex picture emerges. A few have moved up the ladder while others struggle with poverty. Some now have their own children, while HIV/AIDS has devastated too many lives. Money and work, love and family, race and religion remain recurring themes with violence never very far away. These films reveal a rich seam of lively, poignant and sometimes tragic stories which give intimate expression to the epic landscape of contemporary South Africa.

ANA NAOMI DE SOUSA, RIAAN HENDRICKS SPAIN, OCCUPIED WEST BANK, NIGERIA & SOUTH AFRICA 2014, 75min

GRebel Architecture" profiles the new architects using design as a form of activism and resistance, turning away from elite "starchitecture" to design for the majority. 'Santi Cirugeda: Guerilla Architect' introduces us to Cirugeda's work on the edge of Spanish law, where he oversees projects on occupied land, often building with the participation of his clients, making every construction "a reason to come together." 'Eyal Weizman: The Architecture of Violence' follows the dissenting Israeli architect across the West Bank as he analyses architecture's central role in the Israeli occupation and the development of urban warfare. And in 'Kunle Adeyemi: Reality Bites', Adeyemi pioneers floating buildings to solve the issues of flooding, land occupation and construction that affect the 85 thousand residents of Lagos' Makoko slum, and hundreds of thousands more across Nigeria's coastal cities.

As we celebrate South Africa's twenty-years-young democracy, it's easy to forget how the miracle of the rainbow nation could have just as easily never happened. Rewind to 1994 to a country on the brink of civil war: Chris Hani had just been assassinated, the AWB was mustering it's forces, a proposed military coup was being plotted between unlikely allies and the country burned with inter-racial and inter-party violence. The conflict seemed certain to derail the already fraught discussions between Nelson Mandela's negotiators and the outgoing apartheid government. A free and fair election seemed impossible. For the first time, victims, bystanders, key-players and conspirators are brought together in a new truth commission, a forensic examination of our remarkable present. But more than anything, 1994 – The Bloody Miracle reminds us just how crucial it is to understand our history if we are ever to move forward into an enlightened future.

Diaries of a Dissident Poet

SHELLEY BARRY | South Africa | 2014 | 80min

James Matthews, South African and international literary icon, reflects on his tumulteous life, commencing at the District Six Museum at his 83rd birthday celebrations, across two years until is 85th in 2014. Through video-diaries, archival footage and honest self-examination, Matthews tells stories of his early days in the Bo-Kaap, being raised in an abusive household, becoming a single father and jounalist, setting up the country's first black publishing house and the ravaging effects of alcoholism on his life. Through his eyes, we recall the apartheid state that inspired his raging words, described as "a petrol bomb", his imprisonment and the banning of "Cry Rage"—the first book of poetry to be banned in South Africa. In the sweeping, bitter-sweet tradition of the *Plaasroman*, Annalet Steenkamp documents four generations of her Afrikaner family over the course of nine turbulent years as they cling to their identity in a scarred and increasingly unrecognizeable country. Far from being the home to the Afrikaner dream, the rural landscape now quivers with mutual racial animosity and violence. Steenkamp's grandmother flees the family farm, her mother sleeps next to an automatic weapon, and her sister-in-law despairs of raising her family under the shadow of the *Swart Gevaar*. At the same time, Shanel, Steenkamp's born-free neice, speaks fluent Sotho, more at home with the farm's workers than her frankly racist relatives. n 16 August 2012, the South African Police shot and killed 34 striking miners at the Lonmin platinum mine at Marikana. For the past six days, the dead and injured men had been fighting for an increase to their meager wages after negotiations with Lonmin management and competing unions had resulted in the resounding silence of stalemate. Only once the first shots were fired, resurrecting painful memories of Sharpeville and apartheid suppression, did the country begin to listen. Chronicling the days leading up to the strike and subsequent massacre, Rehad Desai masterfully compiles a comprehensive and damning account of complicity between Lonmin, the ANC government and their allies within the National Union of Mineworkers and the police force. minent filmmaker, Jehane Noujaim's Oscar-nominated documentary pushes through the crowds and the rhetoric of Tahrir Square, the downtown Cairo launching-pad of Egypt's nation-wide civil uprising. From 2011, when it was occupied by 50,000 people demanding the removal of President Hosni Mubarak, to the gradual disillunionment and outrage as the regime was replaced by first military, then Islamist rule, Noujaim plants her camera firmly in the heart of the action. The tumultuous events are seen through the eyes of three individuals: Ahmed Hassan, a passionate young revolutionary; *Kite Runner* star Khalid Abdalla; and Magdy Ashour, a member of the Muslim Brotherhood who is torn between two sometimes opposing loyalties. The result is a powerful and extraordinarily stirring record of a work-in-progress revolution, as well as the persistence of hope in the face of cynicism, violence, exhaustion and other seemingly insurmountable odds.

hen Minnaar was first asked to sign a petition against fracking in the Karoo, she had her doubts. Shale gas was supposedly a safe source of energy, with Shell South Africa promising much needed employment in the semi-arid area. But with rumors to the contrary mounting, Minnaar is gradually drawn into an investigation which takes her across the globe to the USA in her search for answers. There, in affected Pennsylvanian and West Virginian communities, the truth about pro-fracking claims begins to emerge. With proof of methane gas and other harmful chemicals in the water resulting in numerous health problems, and desperate witnesses quickly bought off before they can speak out, Minnaar finds herself transformed into an impassioned anti-fracking activist. As the South African government lifts the moratorium on fracking, the race against time begins to share this evidence with Karoo residents, before it is too late.

peration Vula remains one of South Africa's most dramatic untold stories, more gripping than any cloak-and-dagger thriller, and all the more incredible due the seriousness of its stakes. In 1985, the ANC faced a serious strategic problem: with its leaders imprisoned or in exile and apartheid security at an ultimate high, how could they communicate with operatives on the ground? The answer came in the form of Tim Jenkin, a mild-mannered student, but already the veteran of an audacious escape from a high-security Pretoria prison. From a non-descript London apartment, Jenkin and his team, including Siphiwe Nyanda, Ronnie Kasrils, Mac Maharaj and Janet Love, dodged every imaginable danger, implementing an ingenious electronic system to infiltrate South African borders. In so doing, Operation Vula's heroes succeeded in sneaking messages to Nelson Mandela under the very noses of Robben Island guards, bringing the mighty struggle for South African democracy into its home-stretch.

A frica is no stranger to the 'resource curse', the discovery of natural wealth that seems to benefit everyone but the ordinary citizens. Usually, it's only once both foreign investors and politicians have pulled out (with their profits) and the dust has settled that there is time to make sense of what went wrong. But with Big Men, director/producer Boynton was there from the outset, tracing a blueprint of the complex web of decisions, fuelled by chance and greed, that unfolded with Texan start-up Kosmos Energy's discovery of oil in Ghana's waters. As Big Men crosses the globe in a seven-year-long saga, from Dallas to Accra and up the creeks of the Niger Delta where fires set by disenfranchised militants continue to rage, one thing becomes clear: in this dog-eat-dog world of unimaginable gain, the problem may start at the top, but the rot goes all the way down.

After 50 years of civil war, South Sudan gained its independence. Now, the world's newest country needs it's own national soccer team, and it has just the man to make that happen: Zoran Djordjevic, a veteran Serbian coach who'd taken up the cause of troubled teams around the world flies to South Sudan to accept his greatest challenge yet. Highly emotional, ambitious and 110% committed, Zoran throws himself into the task; building goal posts, scouting talent in the remote countryside (for which no map exists) and forming a bitter feud with the president of the Football Association. Despite the backdrop of the country's oil crisis, Zoran refuses to take no for an answer. In the rousing, exuberant and bittersweet adventures that ensue, Zoran adopts 'Champion', a baby sheep, as team mascot and urges his players to become the tigers their country needs them to be: failure is not an option.

Concerning Violence

GÖRAN HUGO OLSSON | Sweden, Usa, Denmark & Finland | 2014 | 85min

Concerning Violence is an adrenaline shot to the heart, a controversial, illustrated manifesto based on philosopher/revolutionary Frantz Fanon's The Wretched Of The Earth. Though he died before he could see the publishing and subsequent banning of his seminal anti-colonial text, Fanon's writings contributed and incited the African liberation struggles of the 6os, 7os and 8os, a time of bloodshed which Fanon predicted as essential in turning the violence of colonialism against itself. Subtitled as 'Nine Scenes From Anti-Imperialist Self-Defense', Göran Hugo Olsson (The Black Power Mixtape 1967-1975), has created another masterpiece of archival research, unearthing footage filmed across the continent, which though forgotten has lost none its urgent potency. Preceded by a prologue by Gayatri Chakraverty Spivak and narrated by Lauryn Hill, Concerning Violence matches it's source text in ferocity, divisiveness and deep concern for mankind.

A small group gathers nervously on the snowy steps of a building in Minsk awaiting a guide who will take them to the secret performance space of the Belarus Free Theatre, an outlawed theatre troupe who dare to speak out against Europe's last remaining dictatorship. The audience has every right to be anxious: under Alexander Lukashenko's regime, only officially sanctioned art is allowed, and any kind of criticism is punishable by censorship, imprisonment—and worse. Against this back-drop of brutal reppression, the Free Theatre's electrifying performances form a strident voice for human rights, even when its members are forced into exile. Comprised of footage smuggled out of the country, Dangerous Acts follows these contemporary political and cultural heroes as they abandon home, family and comfort, leaving behind everything but their refusal to accept a compromised freedom.

oscar winner Alex Gibney (*Taxi To The Darkside*) presents this pulsing tribute to Fela Kuti, Africa's greatest musical legend. The authentic revolutionary voice of his native Nigeria and eventually the continent as a whole, Fela famously fused Yoruba traditional music with Christian chorals, highlife, jazz, the soul of James Brown and Black Power ideology, giving birth to his hypnotic Afrobeat. From his Lagos nightclub, The Shrine, to his own 'republic' commune where he lived with 27 brides, Fela was a stubborn thorn in the side of the military regime, an unstoppable popular force of dissent. He paid the price, but the beatings, brutalisation and imprisonment only fed the fires of his repeated resurrection. A decade after his death, and Fela rises from the ashes again in the form of Broadway smash, *Fela!* causing heated debate over whether the underground maverick can ever truly be translated into the mainstream.

In their free time, Tommy, Danny, Natty, Kajaal and the group's mastermind, Leona, stroll the Berlin streets, stage protests, scavenge from trashcans and cajole pedestrians into joining their eco-erotic quests. But when Fuck For Forest decides to put their beliefs into action by traveling to the Amazon jungle to help indigenous people protect their land, will their Western idealism face its almost inevitable destruction, or might they finally find a place to be free? Not for sensitive viewers, Fuck For Forest is as tragic as it is debauched, but those ready to take the plunge will enjoy a unique experience, as mystical and misunderstood as its misguided protagonists.

The Green Prince

An extraordinary cat-and-mouse tale to rival any Hollywood psychological drama, *The Green Prince* of the title is Mosab Hassan Yousef, son of Hamas leader Sheikh Hassan Youssef, and the crowning jewel in Israel's Shin Bet spy-network. Arrested for smuggling guns to be used against Israel, the 17-year-old Palestinian was thrown into prison where he was confronted with Hamas's torture of its own supposed traitors, while the movement's suicide bombers wreaked untold destruction on the outside. The timing was perfect for Shin Bet handler, Gonen Ben Yitzchak, who easily ushered the disillusioned young man into the ranks of the enemy. Schirman expertly ramps the tension as Mosab is plagued by the shame of his betrayal, and Gonen by the Shin Bet's duplicity, forcing both spy and handler into an unlikely friendship, the only two inhabitants of a secret world that is crumbling around them.

egendary filmmaker Errol Morris (*The Fog Of War, The Thin Blue Line*), conducts this one-on-one inquest of the life, career and philosophy of ex-US Secretary of Defense, Donald Rumsfeld, across his tenure under four Republican presidents, to his role in the controversial invasion of Iraq. Rumsfeld is equal parts charismatic, cagey, frank, ridiculous and terrifying, a man to whom words had ultimate importance, transcribing thousands of memos (which he fondly called 'snowflakes') to his Pentagon colleagues and sometimes himself. In terror of making or admitting mistakes, Rumsfeld dodges Morris's every challenge, pausing only to marvel at the tide of violence in his wake: 'Everything feels amazing in retrospect'. Watching *The Unknown Known*, is to be in the hands of a master-filmmaker, as Morris delivers an incisive portrait of a man and of modern history itself; a history comprised of events too big for even the men responsible for them to comprehend.
