Darkstar (Aiden Whalley & James Young) have been an influential force in the UK's electronic scene. *Foam Island*, the band's third studio LP, is a beautiful contemporary electronic pop album, dealing with powerful themes of ambition and hope against the odds in the 21st century.

Ashlev Kriel, the "Che Guevara of Bonteheuwel" was murdered by the apartheid police in 1987. He was only 20 years old. Peter Casaer | Belgium Guinea Sierra Leone Liberia | 2015 | 70min

The devastating Ebola outbreak of 2013 which swept through West Africa has left a lasting impact on the region and its people. Dealing with the epidemic was one aspect of saving lives, garnering international support another. The dedicated MSF staff, assisted by locals swathed in protective clothing, armed with litres of disinfectant and an urgent desire to help, were at the forefront of confronting the virus. Their ebullience at each life saved in Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone are sadly undermined by the loss of thousands of lives. Fighting a disease, bureaucracy, apathy and stigmatisation, this was a battle with few winners but many heroes. A harrowing indictment on the disparity of health care across the world and a tribute to those who fight it.

Accustomed as we are here, to brutal acts of violence and where rape is commonplace, the horrific rape and attempted murder of Alison Botha in December 1994 shocked the nation. This film recounts the events of the 90 minutes that changed her forever, her hard won physical recovery as well as the emotional and psychological healing which has come through writing and public speaking. Re-imagining her life as a fairy tale, beginning with what she believes to be a miracle, this is a story of extraordinary courage. We meet those who saved her life. pursued justice on her behalf, and the writer who helped her recount the tale - all still touched by the ruin wreaked upon her, and her extraordinary rebirth.

The Black Christ



Jean-Paul Moodie | SA | 2015 | 72min

This sobering slice of South African art history confirms the power of art to challenge repressive regimes, and the brutal response to freedom of expression that is the knee jerk reaction of the oppressors. In 1962 Ronald Harrison painted an image of ANC leader Albert Luthuli as the crucified Christ. His lurking, smirking persecutors in centurion garb are Hendrik Verwoerd and former Minister of Justice, John Vorster. The mild mannered and soft spoken Harrison did not anticipate the rage and revenge this obviously powerful image would unleash. Interrogation, torture and a life of fear at the hands of the apartheid police ensued. The film reminds us of an invaluable piece of South African history and honours a man who paid dearly for a freedom we now take for granted.

In this extraordinary film, Jones follows up on his earlier Kidude biopic, Old As My Tonque, returning to Zanzibar as the accidental detective-film director and would -be interlocutor, determined to get to the bottom of the case. As the story progresses and the entanglements grow murkier, it's Iones' sheer love and awe of the great Kidude that shines through. The result is a mystery story, a personal odyssey and a fitting tribute to one of the greatest African singers of all time.

Following the reign of Gamal Abdel Nasser Hussein, Egypt's second President, dense historical information spliced with archival footage provide a captivating exploration of the country that chose revolution above democracy. Nasser's popularity for his stance on Social Justice, participation in the War of Attrition and nationalisation of the Suez Canal are defining characteristics of Egypt's history. It ends in 1970 with his funeral. attended by 5,000,000 mourners, a spectacle unsurpassed. Leuthy travels with his father and lover to Algeria, the aim is to uncover both men's ties to the country. His father is a Pied-Noir, a fourth generation European migrant to Algeria whose family fled during the Algerian Revolution. This return, some 50 years later, is so that he can make peace with his past. For Leuthy's lover, the expedition is one of discovery, a search for family he has only recently learned about. The journey sees the three men uncover emotions long suppressed and is further complicated as Leuthy and his partner struggle to hide their relationship and sexuality from the intimidating patriarch. Set against the backdrop of rural Algeria the film is a personal and moving meditation on the long-lasting effects of colonialism.

Here, ostensibly everyone may be a 'Matie', but black exclusion and racist policies persist, protected by powerful gatekeepers. In conversation with students and lecturers alike, Kaganof pulls no punches, aiming at the oftensheltered debates around white alliance and privileged spaces. Essential viewing for those of us still uncertain of the issues at stake in the decolonialisation of education and beyond - Opening Stellenbosch takes everyone willing to *luister* behind the scenes of a revolution.

The Pearl of Africa



Jonny von Wallström | Sweden Uganda | 2015 | 74min

In 2014, the Ugandan tabloid Red Pepper published the personal information of 200 LGBTI people in Uganda, Cleopatra Kambugu's name appeared on that list. This tender film tells the story of Cleo's subsequent decision to leave Uganda with her husband, Nelson Kasaija, to undergo gender-reassignment surgery in Thailand. Rather than methodically elaborate the context of Cleo's decision, or the basis of Uganda's virulent anti-LGBTI politics, Swedish director von Wallström quietly observes the couple as they head off, by rail and air, to a new life. His camera records the obvious intimacy that bonds Cleo and Nelson, revelling both in Cleo's loquaciousness and Nelson's steadfast, if largely silent presence. This is a quiet and expansive portrait of two remarkable people.

Having contributed to a victory in Senegal they continue their journey through Africa in a bid to use the beatbox to beat the ballot box. A family scrapbook with missing pages and blank spaces that makes meaning of memories and why we make them.

Twenty-five years after the movie Truth or Dare, which revealed the off-stage life of the tour, her backup dancers reconnect to tell their tales, and it's more revealing than perhaps Madonna would like. The seven young men who scandalised audiences in the 90's reveal deeper truths about their lives and loves post Madonna.

Morgan Knibbe | Netherlands Greece Italy | 74min

This ambitious film begins by placing the viewer in the position of a migrant on a dinghy, which soon capsizes. "Where am I?" asks the roaming ghost of the drowned man as he floats into an unnamed European port city in search of an answer. Moving between the streets where migrants gather in groups, mostly to talk, mourn and wait, and the private places where they eat, sleep and pray, this film is by turns aloof and intimate, harrowing and tender. Knibbe not only patiently observes his subjects, but also quietly listens to their conversations, which are marked by despair and yearning. The outcome is an impression-rich film that is equal parts straight documentary and a cinéma vérité-influenced experiment in narrative.

In 2010 a Brazilian farmer discovers that every brick of his outhouses is stamped with the swastika. Once the property of the aristocratic Rocha Miranda family, there are other disturbing facts unearthed by historian Sidney Aguilar Filho. In the 1930s, fifty orphan boys were transported from Rio to the isolated farm, in a Brazil recently freed of slavery yet obsessed with racial purity and the burgeoning Nazi pseudo-science of eugenics. So, no one intervened when the boys, all black and now numbered, lived and slaved in conditions similar to those of the concentration camps. "23" - Aloisio Silva - survives, with unrequited rage in a country just as terrifyingly prejudiced and secretive as it was in his stolen youth.

Johnson is an award-winning documentary cinematographer who has worked with Michael Moore and Laura Poitras. Her credits include Derrida (2002) and Citizenfour (2014), about Edward Snowden, After a failed attempt to make a film set in Afghanistan, Johnson began to interrogate her large archive. This film collages various bits of footage filmed on assignments in places like Bosnia, Cuba, Liberia, Nigeria and Uganda with material shot in New York and Wyoming in a bid to create a personal memoir built out of images and moments from other peoples' lives. Although largely a meditation on the constructed nature of the film image and the ethics of intimacy and access, this film also offers a candid study of memory, its slipperiness and its frailty.

In the murky London night, in saunas, clubs and private homes, a new epidemic ravages the gay community, Chemsex - a phenomenon in which sex and drugs are inseparable. In a confessional show-and-tell, this Vice-produced documentary invites gay men to bare their souls: tales of loneliness. loss, addiction, alienation and eventual ruin. But the drugs and the uninhibited, prolonged encounters they engender are deeply addictive. There may be no safety manual in an age of Grindr, social media and HIV but these stories cut to the heart: London may be a 'gay friendly' city, but isolation, technology and drugs have created the perfect storm - a burning desire for intimacy and, apparently, gratification. It's as if, in the words of one of an exchemsex you've arrived on a new planet, but vou don't arrive alone.

Notes on Blindness



James Spinney & Peter Middleton UK | 2016 | 90min

In 1983, as writer and academic John Hull began going irreversibly blind, he embarked on an audio diary as a way of making sense of the upheavals rocking his life. Drawing on these, recorded over three years, the filmmakers innovatively pair this documentary sound component with elliptical moving images and docudrama scenes featuring actors lip-synching actual moments of recorded dialogue. Initially Hull's frustrations are at his dwindling professional prospects. But the onset of his blindness also coincided with the birth of his son. Hull speaks of forgetting what his wife and daughter look like. Memory itself becomes elusive. "I am concerned to understand blindness, to seek its meaning, to retain the fullness of my humanity," he says. It is also the ambition of this chiaroscuro-lit, dream-like film.
